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Our History

Victory College was established in 1980 at its present location on Old Maryborough Road, Gympie, and was the former site of the Gympie Cattle Yards.

It was originally known as the Gympie Christian Academy and had humble beginnings with 2 teachers, 2 teacher aides and 36 students. The first classroom doubled as the church for the Christian Outreach Centre and was set up on a Monday and packed up each Friday afternoon.

By 1982 the College numbers had grown steadily and an administrator and additional staff were employed. In 1995 the College changed their curriculum from ACE to the Queensland State Education curriculum incorporating a Biblical worldview.

Following this, an additional 5 acres were purchased and many of the buildings refurbished. A new science and home economics block was built along with an Early Childhood Centre, a manual arts workshop and an art studio.

In 1996 the College introduced a change of uniform along with a new College crest and logo. Then in 1999 the College was renamed to Victory College in recognition of the 'victory' Christ achieved.

2010 saw the completion of further building development including a new library, an international-size sports stadium and a language centre. In 2011 Victory College became an early adopter of the Australian Curriculum from Prep to Year 10 in Maths, English and Science. This decision saw our College be at the forefront of educational change and showed our commitment to ensuring academic standards were continually raised.

2012 was an exciting year as mykindy at Victory was opened offering 24 students a kindergarten education in the year before Prep. We also saw the transformation of our Victory College logo to the one it is today and new Secondary College dress uniforms were introduced.

In 2013 we opened our state-of-the art Science Labs and in 2015 our new Equestrian Centre was completed.

And in September 2017 we opened our new Hospitality Centre that features a professional kitchen and a front of house cafe where parents, staff and senior students can purchase various hot and cold drinks prepared by our barista, as well as delicious treats baked on site by hospitality students.

A roof and additional stables were added to the Equestrian Centre in 2018. In addition, there were 4 new classrooms added to Secondary in 2020 and a new Arts Precinct was also built in 2021.

In early 2022 we completed the renovations and additions at mykindy with two full size classrooms and a new outdoor play area. A new two storey STEM and Art precinct was also completed.

Principal's Report

After five years as Principal at Victory College, I am honored to hand over a College that is growing in many ways. It will be so wonderful for our Middle School students to start 2022 with a new Art Precinct which will make every parent say, "my classrooms were never like this."

I have also watched as God has brought people into our College to help us do amazing things, such as build speedway cars, create a digital literacy and E-sport lab, and raise the standard of our teaching and leadership, to continue to build toward developing quality Christian education for all. It is an incredible College, and God has truly blessed us with a fantastic opportunity to educate young lives in the region.

In the last year alone, so many areas have continued to grow and develop. Our Equestrian team has continued to expand, with about 1/5 of our families participating in 2021. The Victory College Show-jumping Competition became the first interschool event held at our Equestrian Centre and what an amazing success it was, due to the incredible work of our Equestrian staff and parents.

Our Primary Choir performed, "My Lighthouse" at the Eisteddfod and won the Sacred song category. One of our amazing pianists won her section as well, showing the continued development of our Victory Arts students. This year the College introduced violins for every Year 4 student, and in so little time they were able to develop and perform incredibly well, which was a credit to their tutor.

Rugby Union continued to grow, and our teams started to have great success throughout the year. Victory College has been building a reputation as a quality team and worthy opponent, an incredible credit to our coaching staff.

Our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Officer (ATSIO) has worked with the students and local community to present and develop our College's understanding in this area. Tolita Dolzan (ATSIO) also contributed to other Christian schools in Queensland, explaining powerfully the Christian worldview of Welcome to Country at the state conference.

Our staff continued to develop the quality of all that they do. Truly Victory College has an incredible team that is constantly improving practices and pedagogy. In addition, the number of support teachers has grown over the last five years, and they have worked so hard to help every child in their care to achieve their best.

One of the best parts of being a principal is working with the amazing young people who make up our College. This year I have watched our Senior leadership team, Isaac, Myles, Nashota and Mackenzie, continue to grow and develop, sharing at the Vietnam Veterans service, at school assemblies and working with other students to continue to build a culture of Honour, Excellence, and Service.

mykindy is a purpose-built long day care kindergarten providing care and education for children from the age of two to five years. mykindy is co-located on the grounds of Victory College in Gympie and offers the same amazing facilities and guiding values that Victory College has become known for.

All the achievements of the P&F would not be possible without the dedication and support of many volunteers. Our Volunteers are priceless, and we appreciate their willingness to assist.








Strategic Focus Areas

Distinctive Curriculum Offerings

All curriculum from Prep to Year 10 was aligned to the Australian curriculum and developed by the Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA). Study programs in the Senior Years are accredited and monitored by Queensland Curriculum and Assessment Authority (QCAA) and Queensland Tertiary Admissions Centre (QCAT), leading to recognised certificates such as the Queensland Certificate of Education (QCE) and Australian Tertiary Admissions Ranking (ATAR).

Victory College offers a comprehensive program that includes traditional academic subjects, vocational education and training (VET), extension subjects through university partnerships, and extended co-curricular choices. All subjects are framed with an understanding of a Christian world- view.

Agriculture

Agriculture has continued to go from strength to strength this year.

The Hoof and Hook program attracted a lot of student interest and support. All year groups were involved in working with the 4 heifers, whether it was handling, feeding, training or cleaning yards, which has ultimately assisted in a very successful Wide Bay hoof and hook competition this year. An 8-member team travelled to Bundaberg to compete against 150 other students from 14 schools, many with designated cattle and breeding programs, and achieved the following outstanding results:

• 5th place in the Year 9 novice handler division

 \cdot 6th place in the Senior experience division

Led Steers and Heifers

 \cdot 1st, 2nd and 5th place in the category 4 division

Junior Judging

• 5th place in novice senior category
• 1st, 3rd and 5th places in the senior experienced category

The poultry program is providing increasingly more significant teaching and learning opportunities, with the focus being on developing new coops, creating an ongoing sustainable grazing area and becoming an accredited egg producer and processor.

The horticulture program has continued to supply fresh vegetables to Victory Care services on a regular basis; however, all the gardens will be relocating next year closer to the new Agriculture classroom. This task will involve setting up all-new raised gardens, irrigation infrastructure and fencing. I also want to acknowledge the continued support by Wide Bay seedlings to the horticulture program.

Overall, another great year and I wish to thank all involved in Victory Agriculture.

Design & Technology

What an amazing year it has been in Design and Technology, STEM and Information Technology. This year we welcomed Mrs Press to the team and has been a great addition to Mr Eggleston and Mr Innes. She has focused of teaching both STEM and ICT and each class has gone from strength to strength. Her teaching has been inspirational and has brought new projects and enthusiasm to the area.

In Design and Technology, the Year 7 classes have continued with a refined and improved version of the truck toy. The Year 8 class has focused on some design challenge work followed by a timber footstool project. The Year 9/10 classes have worked on a series of design problems with specific needs and have focused on ethics and morality as well as sustainability in materials usage and disposal or re-use. The Senior Design students have stunned and amazed me with their well thought out and considered responses to their design problems. Whereas the Industrial Design Skills (ITS) students have worked both in the automotive workshop and the materials classroom to produce a wide variety of projects. The Building and Construction students have completed a series of projects including wall framing, concreting, designing, and building a pergola, boutique dog houses, cubby houses, plastering and tiling.

In STEM, students have completed a range of projects from solving an agricultural issue, building/coding robotics, building prosthetic limbs, designing and building solar boats, building and racing six differently powered cars, building and flying drones, CO2 dragsters, and navigating the world of virtual reality. In ICT, students have designed and built their own games, provided tutorials on how to use various software, designed and coded a website and created a CD cover utilising Photoshop. Both in ICT and STEM, I have been impressed with the students' ingenuity and passion for their projects.

Equine Studies

Year 7 and 8

It's been a wonderful year, whereby all year 7 and 8 students have been rotated through the Equine Studies elective, gaining an opportunity to learn about and interact with horses, for some, for the very first time. This has been valuable to enable students to see if Equine studies or being involved with horses, is something they may like to explore for the future.

Despite if horses are a student's area of interest, the benefits each gain from the opportunity of interacting with the Equine study horses is often seen through confidence gained, new skills learned, positive relationships formed, fears overcome, and greater self-awareness developed.

Teaching students to understand the origin of the horse, instinctive behaviour, how to read their body language, communicate, care for horses and practice safe handling techniques establishes a comprehensive foundation for further study.

Year 9/10

Year 9 and 10 Equine studies is a composite two-year subject. Students go deeper into the study of horses, covering a variety of topics.

This year the Year 9/10 Equine study students have gone into greater depth in the topics of:

• Horse management and husbandry practices/ safe horse handling practices.

- Horse Breeds.
- Equine Industry.
- \cdot Horse Identification and Conformation

Added practical skills that have been being developed over the year have been in ground-work and re-educating a green horse (through the use of our special project horses Natalie and Annabelle).

These topics have been complimented through the generosity of local Equine industry professional that have blessed our class as guest speakers throughout the year.

Certificate II in Rural Operations (Horse Husbandry Assistant):

Victory College, in collaboration with the International Horse College, offers the Certificate II in Rural Operations (horse husbandry assistant) subject for Year Il students interested in a career in the horse industry. 2021 has seen three Year Il students undertake their Certificate II in Rural Operations (horse husbandry assistant) study.

Equine industry trainer and assessor, Mrs Karen Eggleston, works in conjunction with the International Horse College, to provide training, support and practical assessments on campus at Victory College, utilising the College Equine study horses and Equestrian facility.

The Year 11 students completing their Certificate II, have done extremely well this year amongst all the many challenges and changes, with some having recently completed their qualification and others very close to it. The Certificate II in rural operations (Horse husbandry assistant) has been the launching qualification of entry-level study for students pursuing a career in the horse industry. Victory College is looking forward to continuing to work in collaboration with the International Horse College, to provide a range of industry-related training and qualifications for its senior Equestrian students.

Food Technology

As an elective in Year 9-10, Food Tech has attracted students wishing to further their skills in food preparation and presentation, which will lead into Hospitality for their Senior years. Daily/weekly commitments:

Break time activities for primary colouring-in, stories read by staff/students, Minecraft Club, Book Clubs (if we can get them going again), Tute supervision on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

The Library provides in collaboration with teachers a weekly library class engaging in book talks, read aloud's, nonfiction Dewey decimal system knowledge, regular loans and returns.

A considerable amount of time is spent by supporting individual readers to pick good-fit books which they can enjoy and grow their knowledge. Also, through shared documents, a home reader program is managed through the library for weekly loans noting parental comments and feedback. The year 4 Library monitor program is a beginning leadership role that supports the library and they are trained to re-shelve books, help others, as well as loan and return books on the library Oliver system under supervision.

The Library also catalogue loanable items for various departments so that individual loans can be assigned to students or teachers. Our teacher resource support is well utilised as we offer a Microsoft request form for classroom resources to support term/semester/year. We embrace a supportive engagement within our community Council Library and local school's library network, meeting for social and professional development opportunities to grow and share our knowledge where possible.

Finally, where possible I seek out a supportive on-line community in formal and less formal groups to keep on top of national and state library changes, expectations and programs.






Survey Response Rate











In 2021, 100.0% of Year 12 completers from Victory College were engaged in education, training or employment in the year after they completed school.


Of the 23 respondents, 60.9% continued in some recognised form of education and training. The most common study destination was bachelor degree.

A further 39.1% transitioned directly into paid employment and no further study.


All Year 12 completers were assigned to a main destination. Respondents who were both studying and working are reported as being in education or training, including apprentices and trainees.
